The Society is a place founded to serve as a home for abandoned, strayed or endangered dogs and cats and relies on volunteers to mostly make sure that these animals stay or return to good health.

During the years 2016 and 2017, I travelled to The Animal Welfare Society along with my friends to work as volunteers on Saturdays working from 10:00am to 1:00pm doing various activities. These included:

- Walking the Dogs
- Bathing the dogs and cats
- Washing & Hanging the Clothes
- Feeding the Dogs

Although overwhelming sometimes, with the dog walking, being somewhat of a tedious task, the time spent at the Animal Welfare Society over the course of this one year was the best. I got to meet a lot of dogs and also to make bonds with them, of these were Diva & Nina, Steel, Jessie and Taffy. Of all these dogs, I preferred Diva and Nina. I preferred these dogs because they showed the epitome of a great friendship as they seemed reliant on each other. In addition, they always walked together making it easier for me to keep control of them both. My time at Ark working with my friends accumulated to 50 hours in total with some days reaping from 3-4 hours.

Feeding the Homeless- YAMAD

During February 2015, Young Adults Making a Difference (YAMAD), the youth group of Dayrell's Road Gospel Hall of which I serve currently as General Secretary and Assistant Public Relations Officer decided to launch a Feeding of the homeless Service Project. This activity started from February 2015 and continues even up to today, with the group travelling every 2nd Friday of the month to Heroes' Square where we cater to about on average 90 persons per month with a balanced meal inclusive of a desert, drink and salad. The activity usually starts at 5:30pm and finishes at 7:00pm.

During at least 3 months of the year, the group, under the leadership of Head of the Evangelism Committee Ms. Antonya Taylor makes hampers sometimes shoeboxes, or bags for these persons. These hampers often include canned items and toiletries and are a source of great happiness to these affected persons. In addition we also supply some persons with needed clothing.

In order to do this activity every month, preparation has to occur. On the Thursdays, before the feeding, The group gathers at the church's kitchen to prepare the food. For instance, if macaroni pie is being done the macaroni would be boiled, cheese grated and the process would be completed excluding the baking which would be done the following day. In addition, forks would be wrapped, drink made and utensils packed for the next day. This activity runs from 6:00pm to 11:00pm on average as it sometimes can surpass this 5 hour time span. Thus, for over the 2 years that this activity has been running I have spent 150 hours in community service pertaining to this project.



Reflection

In Deuteronomy 15:11 we read "For there will never cease to be poor in the land. Therefore I command you, 'You shall open wide your hand to your brother, to the needy and to the poor, in your land.". This is a reminder to me, as a Christian that I have a duty to help those around me who are poor. It is truly an inspiring experience to me as well as I later in life would like to become a Doctor, who travels to the relatively poor parts of the word to render healthcare services to those persons who really need it but cannot afford it.

They later gained sponsorship from Voice of Barbados Radio station before my school, Harrison College got onboard. We brought water to school for the project and also went with the water warriors on Sundays to distribute it.

Every Sunday starting from 8th October, 2017 and ending 5th November ,2017 we travelled from Harrison College to Warrens, where we would meet up with the Water Warrior Team. From there we sometimes went to Glacial Pure to get more water before making our way into various parts of the island distributing water to those persons who needed it. These five visits enabled me to complete 8 hours of community service per day, totalling 50 hours.

Barbados Secondary School Entrance Examination

Annually, Class 4 students of All Primary schools in Barbados take the Barbados Secondary School Entrance Examination (BSSEE), commonly known as the 11+. This examination sees the step of about 5000 children from Primary to Secondary Schools throughout the island. Students take this examination at various examination centres. Of these examination centres is my school, Harrison College. The individual centres require helpers, to transport the examinees to the bathroom as well as to help with anything needed to be done. My responsibility was to be the team leader for the Volunteers.

The Thursday before the examination I worked alongside the other students preparing classrooms for the exam, that is, evenly spacing the desks, sticking the papers bearing the examinees' names on the tables and removing any extra desks from the classroom. In addition, I also allocated all of my colleagues to their respective rooms.

On Tuesday 2nd May, the day of the examination, I worked alongside my Year Head, Mrs. Gloria Haynes, to make sure that all classrooms were fitted with enough volunteers to transport everyone to the bathroom. I also momentarily walked children to the bathroom myself. However, at the beginning of the day I worked tirelessly, walking from my school's gate to the hall numerous times transporting the examinees through my school! Through my service to school on Friday and on Tuesday I was able to able to gain 12 hours of service.



Reflection

I loved it! Reminiscing on my 11+ day I remember how frightened I was, overwhelmed by the rather strange surroundings which I was going to do my examination in and this motivated me to do this task. I would've travelled the weekend prior from Friday to represent Barbados and would've returned the day before (Monday). I had first determined that I would use the opportunity to gain some rest, however after giving it some thought, I decided to attend. I used the opportunity afforded to me to make the examinees feel comfortable. As I walked them down to my hall, I was sure to start a conversation with them, making sure they were all feeling well, required nothing and ready to get As!
